

If you use Carlisle oars and would like to have a little more power, consider buying a one-foot extension. This will increase the mechanical advantage, thereby providing more power.

aturday, April 16 was the date for this year's Tax Relief Float on the middle Deschutes. We had 13 boats and 20-plus people. The day was partly cloudy with some wind above Oak Springs — and no rain! The flow of 8,000 cfs made for some interesting changes in this 11-mile run from Harpham Flats to Sandy Beach. Wapanitia was scooting right along with some of the big boulders buried. The large boulder at the bottom (the one my boat always heads toward) was only partially visible. The high current easily moved my boat to the right of this obstacle. Boxcar was also quite easy. I went through first, then stopped in the eddy on the right to take pictures of everyone else.

We stopped at Grey Eagle for lunch and a bit of relaxation in partial sun and about mid-fifties temperature. When we cast off again, a considerable wind picked up just before we got to Oak Springs. Of course it would be blowing hard when everyone was trying to get into position to run the rapids.

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

The only difference is this: if you send an email to it, your message is delivered to everyone in the club in their email inbox. Do you have your Invasive Species tag yet? If not, you can purchase Oregon and Idaho Invasive Species tags through the Oregon Whitewater Association. Bruce Ripley has worked a deal with Oregon and Idaho that allows OWA club members to purchase Invasive Species tags for both Oregon and Idaho through the club. You can purchase a 2-Year Oregon tag for \$12.

These tags are made of tyvek, are virtually indestructible and you can attach it to your boat. The tags currently being sold are for 2011-2012. If you already have your 2011 tag, we will offer 2012-2013 tags at the October meeting this fall. The one-year Idaho tag is \$8.50.



hat has turned into an annual event was held April 8-10 as the NWRA and OWA clubs held a joint whitewater rally on the North Umpqua River. For the second year in a row, the two clubs floated a section of the lower river together. This year we stayed in the Whistler's Bend county campground and floated to a takeout east of the Winchester Dam. The event was topped off with a Dutch oven cook off Saturday night with everyone voting on the best main dish, best side dish, and the best dessert.

The kickoff started Friday night with Brad and Margaret Ann Carlson cooking steamed oysters over an open fire and serving them with garlic butter and cheese. The oysters were fresh out of Coos Bay, big, and absolutely delicious.

Saturday morning we woke up to overcast, but clearing skies.

At noon 12 rafts and one kayak pushed off from Whistler's Bend boat ramp and floated down to a takeout just east of the Winchester Dam. The average flow along this section is 1500 cfs, but due to rain earlier in the week, the water flow on Saturday morning was approximately 7,500 cfs. The water wasn't over the banks, but many of the islands were submerged under water with weeds and sage grass sticking up above. Walt Bamman from the NWRA Roseburg chapter led the way. The scenery was beautiful, and the weather was great. Everyone - especially the kids - had a great time.

The banks of the Umpqua in this section are heavily forested with short scattered cleared areas where very nice riverside homes are built. One of the advantages of April floats is the lack of traffic on the river. Other than a couple of fishing boats our group had the river to ourselves. The most challenging water in this section is Dixon Falls which is a Class III turbulent drop that everyone negotiated easily. One dog took a short swim, but the people only got splashed. At approximately 3:30 pm the group started arriving at the takeout. Because of the fairly steep bank, it took nearly an hour to get all 13 craft out of the river and headed back to camp.

By 7:30 pm the Dutch ovens had worked their magic, and the big meal began. Gary Steffy had so many ovens cooking that he used two large bags of charcoal keeping them heated. To say that we had plenty of food would be an understatement – and all of it was delicious.

After all the votes were cast, Bruce Ripley's spare ribs took top honors in the main dish category. Margaret Ann Carlson's Yugoslavian cheese bread was voted best side dish, and her

At no time was I in danger of flipping, but I iust don't like losing control in the middle of a class IV. I regained the oars about 100


feet later. Oak Springs proved to be an exciting rapids for just about everyone.

2011 Upper Clackamas Whitewater Festival

he Upper Clackamas White Water Festival (known to insiders as "Clack-Fest") is a two-day gathering of the Pacific Northwest's whitewater community. Each May, when the spring rains and snow melt have swelled the river to its juiciest levels, you'll find one of the biggest and longest-running rafting and kayak competitions in the world. Around 1,000 people a day arrive in Mount Hood National Forest, to race down the raging Clackamas River, cheer on their favorites, or participate in one of the many whitewater clinics.

A big part of the festival is to promote safety and whitewater education among recreational boaters, so clinics are offered covering first aid, swiftwater rescue, fishing and everyone's favorite: Dutch Oven cooking. Experts are brought from around the state to share their knowledge and expertise. Equipment vendors show off the latest and greatest



in whitewater technology.

However, this is not your average convention-style boatshow. The whitewater races start every 30 minutes and always steal the show. Slalom gates are set up in the middle of the biggest Class IV rapid on the river, Carter Falls, with gate 3 placed in the most challenging part of the rapid. There are events for every watercraft imaginable: paddle rafts, catarafts, inflatable kayaks, hardshell kayaks, riverboards, and drift boats. Beyond the boat types are the race categories: slaloms, sprints, downriver, Boater X, and the amazing Big Air Competition. The latter showcases kayaks sliding down a

25-foot ramp, which are propelled into the air. Whoever does the best tricks before hitting the river wins. There is an event for everyone with both team and individual competitions, but most of the time, it's the spectators that win the biggest prize by watching all the mayhem.

2011 will be the 28th annual Clack-Fest and will host the USRA (United States Rafting Association) Nationals presented by AIRE. 6-man paddle boat teams from across the country will compete in 4 diciplines, Sprint, Head-to-Head, Slalom, and Downriver, with the winner representing the US at the World Championships in Costa Rica later this year. Clack-Fest is a wonderful event for the local whitewater community and the Oregon Rafting Team, which is excited to host this year's Nationals Competition.

Zach Collier is the owner of Northwest Rafting Company and an active participant in Upper Clackamas Whitewater Festival. This year he's training hard to prepare for Nationals.
